Dear Friends.

I was going to write about something completely different this week until I read my UCB notes for today (Wednesday). It seemed so appropriate that I'm copying it out in full, with apologies to regular UCB readers who will have seen it already.

'He changes times and seasons ... He gives wisdom' Daniel 2:21 NIV

Realise that rough times won't last forever. As surely as God created spring to follow winter, 'He changes times and seasons...He gives wisdom'. The season of adversity you're in will end. And when it does, you'll glean from it the wisdom to build a better future. Sometimes your greatest blessings come from your most negative circumstances. Paul writes, 'Our present troubles are small and won't last very long. Yet they produce for us a glory that vastly outweighs them and will last forever!' (2 Corinthians 4:17). Tough times won't last, but tough people do! Out of your greatest tests come your greatest testimonies. Don't make major decisions during a storm. Thoughts and feelings often run wild in the midst of a crisis; those are times when you need to be careful about making decisions. Remain calm, discipline yourself to focus on what you can do, and trust God to do what you can't. Just as a pilot error can cause a plane to diverted from its intended destination, or have to make a dangerous emergency landing, a bad decision can divert or delay you from reaching your destiny. Let your emotions subside before you decide. You may not always have that option, but as much as possible, put significant decisions on hold until your storm passes. Just as the wind blows about wildly during a storm, your thoughts can become wild and frantic, and that's not the best time to make crucial assessments. What should you do? Paul answers, 'Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and... His peace will guard your hearts and minds' (Philippians 4: 6-7).

Words that offer us much hope and comfort in what is fast becoming an uncertain situation. This week we were advised that we could return to work if we couldn't work from home. It seems certain that for many this may be a mixed blessing. Whilst it will mean that families will be getting an income once again there are numerous concerns about transport, childcare, job security and not least personal safety. Please hold in your prayers all those who are faced with difficult choices and the anxiety that this is causing. Please pray also that the new "Stay Alert" message will become clearer over the next few days as people struggle to work out just what this means for them as individuals. For us (Liz and Angela) it will mean that very little will change and we suspect that is the case for many of us. It is a most challenging time and as the previous passage reminds us, we need to pray and keep on praying.

On the subject of praying we are all urged to join in with Thy Kingdom Come which this year begins on Ascension Day (21st May) and runs until Pentecost (31st May). Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray for more people to come to know Jesus. What started in 2016 as an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer resources linked to Thy Kingdom Come 2020 which you can find here.

Gay had told her small group the story of Leah and has been praying for her for some time. Leah Sharibu refused to renounce her faith. She paid the price with her freedom. Leah was one of 110 girls abducted from their school in Dapchi, Nigeria by Islamic State West Africa Province (ISWAP) an offshoot of Boko Haram in February 2018. The next month, following negotiations by the government, the girls were put into vehicles to go home. However, Leah wasn't among them. She wasn't released because she refused to convert in exchange for her freedom.

A group from along from our house and down the road and then an separate group at the bottom gathered outside with tables, chairs and their tea and scones, or similar, (glass of wine,) and socialised for a couple of hours. It was nice to sit in

the sun and see and chat to neighbours. There was bunting from upstairs windows and along hedges, and it was quite festive. There were not any of the old songs, but I did enjoy a hearing a recording of Albert and the Lion! It really took me back!

Our heart rehab gym class were asked on line to share any war time memories. I did remember the air raid sirens of London, though not going into the cellar. And I did remember the thrill of bananas arriving in the country following the war, and the end of rationing, having only recently thrown away my ration book!! Hardly good news just now, except to remind us of how fortunate we are with the variety and quantity of food we all have available."

There seems to be a great community spirit as people come out on a Thursday evening to salute the NHS and other key workers all of whom are doing a wonderful job in really difficult circumstances. Locally, we are really fortunate to have businesses and services that have worked incredibly hard and have seen a huge increase in custom. You may have seen the recent article in the Sheffield Telegraph where Taj (the pharmacist) is reminding people to "use it or lose it"


Amy Wrigglesworth has sent a short message to let us know what she has been up to these last few days *Today we went walking in Gillfield Wood to have a look at the*
